

Sweet Red Cabbage

21b red cabbage

- 2 large cooking apples
- 2 tbsp cider vinegar
- 4 oz sultanas
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- 2 tbsp olive oil

Shred the cabbage. Peel, core and slice apples. Put the sliced cabbage and apples and the rest of the ingredients into a large casserole dish and cook/simmer slowly for about one hour, stirring halfway.

This is a great accompaniment to pork and goose! I had it for the first time with Venison at Oxford - with Roger Banister, a lovely man!

Chocolate Irish Cream

14fl oz double cream

14floz milk

- 2 tbsp cocoa powder
- 4 oz milk chocolate
- 4 tbsp Irish whiskey

Whip the cream in a bowl until it holds its shape. Put milk into a milkpan and gradually whisk in the cocoa powder, break the chocolate into small pieces and add and heat gently. Stir until all chocolate has melted and bring to boil. Remove from heat and add the whipped cream and Irish whiskey stir gently until blended. Pour into heat proof glasses and serve at once! Serves 4.

A delicious way to end a relaxing Christmas evening!

Hasselback Potatoes

This Swedish dish takes its name from Hasselbacken, the Stockholm restaurant where it was first served. The potatoes are crispy on the outside and soft and fluffy on the outside and they look really cool!

- 4 baking potatoes
- 2 tbsp melted butter
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 tbsp Pecorino Romano cheese finely grated

Peel potatoes, cut in half length ways, place flat-side down on the chopping board and cut down very finely leaving bottom 1 cm intact. Place the potatoes flat side down onto a large roasting dish. Brush the melted butter over the potatoes and then pour the olive oil around over the base and around the potatoes. Bake in a Gas mark 5 oven for 35-40 mins, drizzle with butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper and grated cheese. Bake for another 20 mins until golden brown.

Pears Roman style

This is a simple dish loved by the Romans! I am sure Caesar Augustus would have eaten this with great relish!

Take 6 soft pears and stand them upright and snugly in an ovenproof dish. Bake for 30mins Gas Mark 6. Remove from the oven and pour $\frac{3}{4}$ pint of red wine over the pears and sprinkle them with 4oz caster sugar. Bake for another 20mins the wine and sugar will thicken and make a delicious sauce. Serve warm or chilled with double cream. Yum!

The Children's Society was founded in 1881 by a Sunday School teacher, Edward Rudolf, who was horrified when he found some of the children attending his Sunday School classes were begging for food on the streets. He wanted the Church of England to be at the forefront of social action for such children. Initially this involved the setting up of children's homes around the country supported by parishes and individuals which were small family groups well integrated into their local communities. It also became one of the largest adoption agencies in the country. From the 1970's however the Children's Society moved away from this type of action and into supporting young people and families thelp themselves. Day Care Centres and Family Centres were set up around the country, toy libraries were opened, adult education provided and community and development teams involving local people were organised to give people a voice and input into local problems. In the 1990's the Society started a more proactive role involving campaigning for changes in the law to better protect young people and in various projects to support and empower them. One of these projects, 'Safe in the City', is supported by our church.

Safe in the City Manchester has been running for about 16 years now and supports about 2000 children a year working with vulnerable children many of whom are runaways and living on the streets. 100,000 children runaway each year in the UK, a horrific number. Nobody is ever turned away from Safe in the City and children are given the hope and confidence they need to face their futures with optimism. This ties in perfectly with the Children's Society core values of love, justice and forgiveness. We have over the years supported them by providing them with toiletries such as soap and shampoo, bubble bath and hair bobbles, all the items young people living rough and with nothing would long for.

For 40 years the Children's Society Christingle has been a key part of the joyous celebration of Christmas and has raised essential funds to support the work of the Society. Our 'Smartie tube collection' goes to support the excellent work of the Children's Society in general but at our Christingle service on the 9th December we are asking people to donate a few 'smellies', something a young person would be happy to receive and to bring them to church on that day. The service will be a celebration of the love of Christmas and of the hope and promise of our children and young people for the future. We will, of course, have the oranges and the candles and the fruit, made by the young people, hopefully with no cocktail stick accidents! But we will also as the Wise Men did bring our gifts to offer so that the hope of Christmas is rekindled in the young people who receive them. I hope to set you there!


At the Christingle Service this year we shall be having a member of the Children's Society 'Safe in the City' Team from Manchester coming to talk to us about the work they do.

We have a shiny new swimming baths enjoyed by young and old.


We also enjoy exotic cuisine, food from around the world.

Weekend Away at Scargill House

3rd - 5th May 2013

After the successful weekend at Scargill House in the Yorkshire Dales in May of this year it was decided to have a repeat visit in 2013. The pattern will be similar to this year with teaching input from the Scargill Community, time to worship together and free time to explore the local area. The theme will be 'Making the Best of Our Gifts', as we celebrate being part of the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12).

The weekend will begin at teatime on Friday 3rd May and finish after lunch on Sunday 5th May.
