

Earlier this summer I was out cutting the grass around the vicarage and church. I stopped for a moment to admire the view across the fields and saw a combine harvester at work. So I put my lawnmower away, fetched my camera and went out to take some photos. After all, it's not a sight we'll see there much more.


Plans are well in hand to relocate farmer lan, his family and his cattle and to build around 600 houses on those fields. It's thought that building could begin as early as next year. So maybe some of my photos will one day be found in the local history archives showing the way things were!

I know that many people would rather we could keep things the way they are. But the Government has worked out that a lot of new houses are going to be needed - and I happen to believe the Government's right. The debate is about what sort of houses and where they're going to be built. Yet once all the houses have been built, I'm sadly certain that we'll still have people who are homeless and street dwellers in our society. And despite a plentiful harvest, I'm sadly certain that we'll still have people around us who are hungry and in need of clothing.

The combine harvester that I saw was out gathering in the grass to provide winter feed for the cattle. When winter comes and fields cannot be grazed, the farmer will provide food and shelter for his cattle. But what about the homeless and the hungry people on the streets of Manchester? Who will provide for them?

Long ago, back in the time of Moses, God established the harvest festivals for his people. God also established another harvest rule: "When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and the alien." That's in Leviticus chapter 23. Now in our time, as Christians - God's people today - it's right that we continue with the harvest festival tradition. It's also right that, out of our plenty, we make provision for the needy.

So we shall continue with our tradition at St. John's. For our Harvest Festival on October 13th please bring or send in to church an offering of tinned and packet foods and toiletries, socks and underwear etc. These will be given to the Barnabus Project for its work with the homeless in Manchester.



The PCC Secretaries Notebook

A few weeks ago | spent a very pleasant evening at Nick and Adele's beautiful home, along with other friends from our church. It was a lovely warm summer evening. When | was ready to go home it was raining cats and dogs, literally pouring down. Not to worry, my car was only just around te corner. Nick and Adele waved me off and | set off with my handbag over my head, eyes to the ground watching where | was walking as | am quite prone to veering off somewhere if not concentrating. When | did look up | expected to see my car but it wasn't there. I stood trying to get my bearings. It was strange because there were no familiar landmarks. I couldn't go back to Nick and Adele's home as | quite literally didn't know where | was and there was no one around to ask.

I walked around and then looked down one particular road. There was no one around except for someone sat on a bicycle quite literally across the middle of the road so I walked down that road. After all one road is as good as another when you are lost. The person on the bicycle was a young boy about maybe 10/12 years old. He was already soaked to the skin but was just sat there astride his bike. I stopped and asked him what he was doing just sat there in such heavy rair. He said he was staying with people on the estate but had been locked out. He didn't seem bothered at all. So that made two soaking wet souls.

I told him where I thought I had parked my car and he said he would take me to it. We continued down the road which was really leading nowhere except into the woodland. I should have been wary but the funny thing is I wasn't. We ended up in the woodland in the dark, in the pouring rain and soaked to the skin. He walked alongside me and kept turning the handlebars from side to side. He said this was to light the way for me and show me I was safe. For a young boy he seeme so grown up and very polite and actually took control of the situation. He eventually led me to my car. I asked him if he wanted to sit inside for a while out of the rain. Not that it mattered at that point as we were both absolutely dripping. He said no, and that he was fine. I unlocked my car, looked up and he was gone.

I can't get out of my mind what happened that night, and I can't explain it, but it is absolutely true. If that wasn't some spiritual experience then I am privileged to have spent a very strange experience with such a lovely lad. Not or one second was I frightened or suspicious although I know I should have been. He was just there, sat on his bike in the pouring rain just when I needed someone to help.

By the way, being soaked to the skin without a coat is really a liberating experience.

Favourite hymn - 1st November All Saints Day

For all the saints, who from their labours rest, who thee by faith before the world confessed, thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blessed.

Alleluia, Alleluia!

Thou wast their Rock, their Fortress and their Might;

thou, Lord, their Captain in the well fought fight;

thou, in the darkness drear, their one true Light.
Alleluia, Alleluia!

O may thy soldiers, faithful, true, and bold, fight as the saints who nobly fought of old, and win, with them the victor's crown of gold.

Alleluia, Alleluia!

O blest communion, fellowship divine! we feebly struggle, they in glory shine; all are one in thee, for all are thine.

Alleluia, Alleluia!

And when the strife is fierce, the warfare long, steals on the ear the distant triumph song, and hearts are brave, again, and arms are strong Alleluia, Alleluia!

The golden evening brightens in the west; soon, soon to faithful warriors comes their rest; sweet is the calm of paradise the blessed.

Alleluia, Alleluia!

But lo! there breaks a yet more glorious day; the saints triumphant rise in bright array; the King of glory passes on his way. Alleluia, Alleluia!

From earth's wide bounds, from ocean's farthes coast,
through gates of pearl streams in the countless host,
and singing to Father, Son and Holy Ghost:
Alleluia, Alleluia!

This wonderful hymn is traditionally sung on the 1st November for the 'Feast of all Saints'. It was written by William Walsham How, the Bishop of Wakefield in 1864 and set to the tune 'Sine Nomine' (Without name) by Ralph Vaughan Williams which has been called the 'finest hymn tune of the 20th century'. Since I started researching this hymn I have not stopped singing it all day! I love a song you can belt out, I especially like the last verse!

All Saints Day, sometimes known as All Hallows' Eve, is an opportunity for Christians to remember saints and martyrs. In the Roman Catholic Church it is followed by 'All Souls' Day' on the 2nd November when the faithful departed are remebered and relatives visit thei graves. In Mexico it is known as the "Day of the Dead' and people have picnics on graves and decorate their houses and transport with lively images of the dead.

William Walsham How was involved in the ministry in Shropshire for over 30 years and wrote many poems and religious books whilst there, also finding time to found the first public library in Oswestry. He is perhaps most known however as the 'children's bishop' when he worked in the East End of London working with the industrial poor especially children. He was made the first Bishop of Wakefield in 1888 but died on holiday in Ireland and is buried at his favourite parish at Whittington in Shropshire.

Ralph Vaughan Williams is one of the best known English composers of the 20th century and a great collector of traditional folk songs and tunes. He was friends with Holst, Parry and many other composers and was the great, great grandson of Josiah Wedgewood and great nephew of Charles Darwin. He is seen as the quintessential English composer and wrote symphonies, ballets, songs, operas, film music and lots of other stuff!

Apple and eider sausage casserole

Ingredients:

6 thick sausages

50g butter

125g cider

125ml double cream

1 small onion chopped

300g of chopped eating apples

1 tbsp plain flour

Melt $\frac{1}{2}$ the butter in a heavy frying pan and fry the sausages until brown on all sides, remove from pan and leave. Put the other half of the butter into the pan, add the onions and cook gently until softened. Add the chopped apple and cook for about a minute, sprinkle in the flour to make a roux. Pour the cider over and mix into a smooth sauce. Slowly bring to the boil and reduce then add the cream and salt and black pepper to taste. Return to heat and cook slowly for about 20-25mins until tender and cooked through.

Auntie Sarah's Lancashire Parkin

Ingredients;

2 cups of flour

1 cup of Oatmeal

1 cup of milk

1 cup of sugar

1 lb margarine

1 ½ tablespoons treacle

½ teaspoon

½ teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon ginger

Put flour, oats, sugar into a bowl and mix. Put bicarb, baking powder and ground ginger into the cup of milk and stir before adding to rest of ingredients.

Add treacle (easy way to get treacle from tin 'clearly' is to dip spoon into a mug of really hot water).

Mix all ingredients together until a lovely tan colour (no white lumps of flour) and bake in 8inch square cake tin, Gas number 4 for 1 hour.




A friendship to treasure

Some October dates of Interest!

From the Wardens Yearbook with additional exciting facts!

Friday 4th October. Francis of Assisi.

There will be more on St Francis in later magazines but the nearest Sunday to this day is Animal Welfare Sunday. This day is promoted by the Anglican Society for the Welfare of Animals. The theme for 2013 is endangered spices of which there are many even in the UK for example the Red Squirrel and the Watervole.

'Animal Welfare Sunday is a day in the Church's calendar on which we take time to think more deeply about our fellow creatures. On Animal Welfare Sunday, we address issues of the well-being of non-human animals, the suffering that human activity causes to our fellow creatures and our responsibility as Christians to alleviate suffering and promote the welfare of all of God's creatures. We also take time to think about the place of animals in God's Kingdom.'(ASWA)

First Sunday In October. Harvest Festival of the Costermongers.

On this day the Pearly Kings and Queens assemble at St Martin in the Fields on Trafalgar Square for a service of thanksgiving. Costermonger is a term used to describe street traders often of fruit and generally in London, they joined together to protect their trades and had Kings and Queens. They were traditionally cordurely trousers and at least one neckerchief and bright buttons often in Mother of Pearl. These developed into the pearly costumes that are worn today; these can have up to 20 000 buttons and weigh up to 60lbs! They also wear wide brimmed hats with towering ostrich feathers. In 1951 a pearly King and Queen of London were first elected during the Festival Of Britain and the Marriot family hold the post hereditarily until 2051 when there will be another election. The Pearlies are famous for their charity work organised initially by Henry Croft a Victorian road sweeper and rat catcher who started work at the age of 23. He decorated his outfit with pearly buttons and collected money to help the needy in the same way as the costermongers helped each other (you can see a marvellous silent Pathe film of his funeral in 1930 on the Internet). He was so successful in his flamboyant costume that he asked other costermongers to help and this charity work soon spread. His family are still involved and his great grandaughter is the Pearly Queen of Somers Town. They recently raised £65 000 in Hackney for a hydrotherapy pool for a local pool and at every coronation there is a real cockney 'knees up' which raises money for supported charities recently 'Help For Heroes'.
